Dear Siblings in Christ,

Over the years, my thinking concerning Easter has become more and more simplified. I don't spend nearly as much time trying to understand, explain or make sense of what happened. I am more comfortable with accepting the story at face value.

You know the story as well as I do. Jesus died on the cross. He was buried. The tomb was sealed. On the third day, the stone was rolled away and the women who came to anoint Jesus' body were told, "He has been raised; he is not here."

I don't have explanations for any of that. But I have experiences of that. I've seen it happen in my life and in the lives of other people. I read it everywhere in the scriptures. Easter resurrection isn't new. It's the pinnacle of what God has been doing all along.

For example, have you ever been freed from patterns or behaviors that diminished your life? Isn't that new life? Isn't that a retelling of the Israelites escaping the bondage of Israel? Have you ever had new insights into your life? A new way of seeing the world, another person or yourself? Every blind person whose eyes were opened by Jesus experienced new life, a resurrection. Have you ever felt stuck, without energy or direction in life? Remember the paralyzed man and Jesus saying, "Stand up, take up your mat and walk?" That's resurrection. Or think about a time when you felt a new sense of energy, enthusiasm or creativity. That's the resurrection breath of God blowing through your valley of dry bones.

These kinds of things are happening all the time in thousands of ways. They invite us to think of Easter as a verb rather than a noun. Something active that's happening in us and with us. I wonder...where do you see life and more life arising?

<u>Core Value – Service: Literacy Volunteers Ontario – Yates</u>

Each month as a congregation we financially support a local organization or ministry with our Local Hunger Offering. During April we will continue supporting Literacy Volunteers Ontario - Yates with our offerings. In connection with our Core Value of "Service", we are highlighting this ministry by having Cheryl Flynn, their Penn Yan Coordinator, speak about them during worship on April 13, 2025.

The mission of the Literacy Volunteers Ontario – Yates (LVOY) is to "Provide adults the literacy skills needed to reach their full potential as individuals, parents, workers and citizens". They work with people in Ontario and Yates Counties. LVOY's "primary programs – literacy for native English speakers and English for speakers of other languages – serve learners from all walks of life". The people they serve range from young adults to retirees. LVOY primarily teaches on a one-on-one basis using trained volunteer tutors.

celebrating Jesus' victory over death and the risen Jesus will return to us again and again in the mystery of holy communion, inviting us to touch and taste his presence, and offering us his peace.

There will be a few changes in the liturgy beginning on Easter Sunday and continuing through out the Easter Season. We will use Setting Three (found on pages 140-146 in the ELW) for Holy Communion. Our Gospel Acclamation is number 175 found in the Service Music of the ELW. We will use the Nicene Creed and sing one verse of Hymn 678, God, Whose Giving Knows No Ending for our Offertory Hymn. The prayers, the benediction, and the sending verses will all be new to us during this season. All of these pieces, along with the hymns we sing, enhance the theme of each Sunday's worship.




