- All: Amen.









- A: I shall not die, but I shall live, and recount the deeds of the Lord.

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The Gospel

- P: The Gospel according to John.
- All: Glory to you, O Lord.

John 20:19-31

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve,

was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.




Sermon

Following the sermon, there is a time of silence for reflection and quiet meditation. Our liturgy is made up not only of words, gestures, and music, but also moments of silence.

As the hymn begins, the assembly stands to sing.





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Nicene Creed

- A: With the whole church, let us confess our faith.
- All: We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.
 We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from

true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Prayers of Intercession

A: God, in a world where proof is everything and faith often seems foolish, give us courage to proclaim what the Spirit has revealed to us, not through our eyes but through our hearts and lives. God of grace and mercy,

A: From seas to mountains to great plains to deserts, all of creation is the work of your hand. Teach us to tend to it with great love and care. God of grace and mercy,

All: receive our prayer.

A: We lift up leaders in the church, including pastors, deacons, and bishops. Guide them with your truth and help them to lead with compassion and understanding. God of grace and mercy,

All: receive our prayer.

- A: Be with doctors, nurses, and all medical staff. Guide their work with wisdom and understanding and skill. Draw near to those who are in need of your healing (*especially...*) God of grace and mercy,
- All: receive our prayer.

A: Be with those who mourn this day. May they cherish memories of their loved ones, and may you bring them peace. God of grace and mercy,

All: receive our prayer.

Here other intercessions may be offered.

- A: We remember with joy all the saints, like Stephen, who lived and died in the faith. May we follow their example and live our lives to you. God of grace and mercy,
- All: receive our prayer.
- P: These and the prayers of all creation we lift to you in Jesus' name.
- All: Amen.

- P: The peace of Christ be with you always.
- All: And also to you.


We Share God's Meal

- All: Amen.


The Lord's Prayer

Hymn Notes "Touch That Soothes and Heals" ACS 939

Mary Louise Bringle (1953-) Is Professor of Philosophy and Religious Studies and Chair of the Humanities Division at Brevard College (Brevard NC). She has written hymns since 1999 and published two collections of her work: "Joy and wonder, love and longing" (2002) and "In wind and wonder" (2007). Her hymns and anthem texts are numerous and well represented in many denominations. We have sung her hymn "As the winter days grow longer" during Lent.

This text is filled with the images of caring through the works of Jesus as we are commanded to love one another through our works of faith. As the resurrected Christ,

Jesus showed his hands and feet to Thomas and the others; Jesus' sacrificial use of his earthly body was the ultimate gift of Love. As a redeemed people we are called to offer our selves, souls, and bodies to truly "live as ones I died to save."

Greg DeMey (1972) has a BA in Music Theory and Composition from Calvin College and graduated from Calvin Theological Seminary (M Div. 2006) He is currently the Teaching Pastor at Elmhurst Reformed Church in Elmhurst IL.

The tune "CIVILITY" is an alternate tune for "There's a wideness in God's mercy." It has a gently flowing character with a comfortable melodic range. The texture is simple with warm light and dark harmonies.

The lowest note in the stanzas sets the words "loaf of bread, need of care, first and least, prepare a meal" and melodically joins them with Jesus' sacrifice in the closing phrase of the refrain "live as ones I died to save." There is a gentle harmonic finish with the IV-I cadence instead of the usual V-I and we hear this as the familiar chords of a sung Amen.
